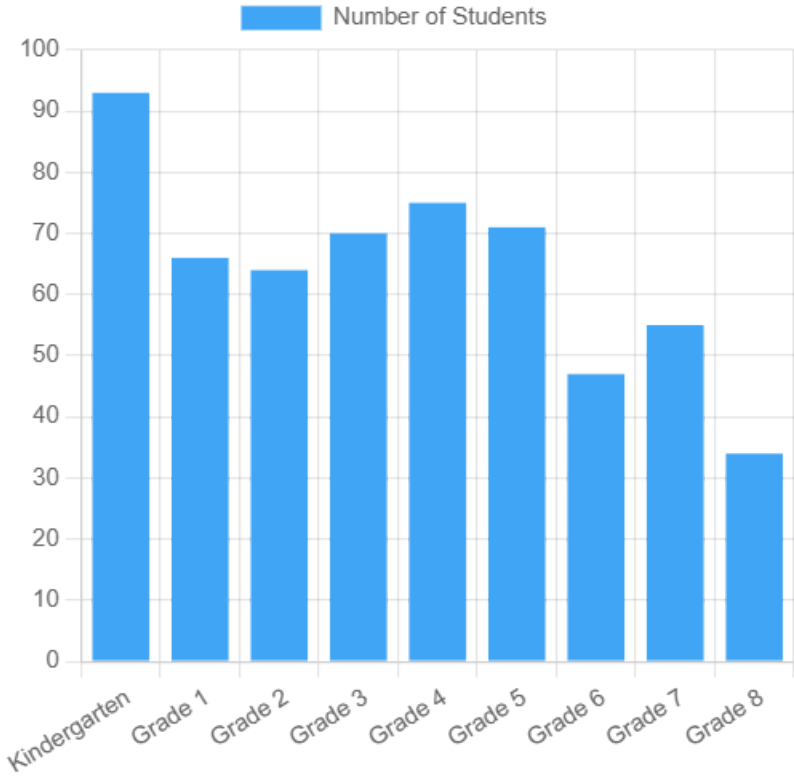

Lashon Academy takes great efforts to ensure the school facility is clean, safe, and functional. As a prop 39 co-located campus we follow all inspections, surveys, maintenance, and repairs per Los Angeles Unified School District. The results of all facility inspections are available at the school office. The school has ample classroom space, use of multipurpose rooms, and administrative offices in order to provide for the most effective learning environment.

Lashon Academy works in conjunction with LAUSD maintenance staff to ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority. The principal works daily with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure that students are provided with a clean, safe, and functional learning environment.

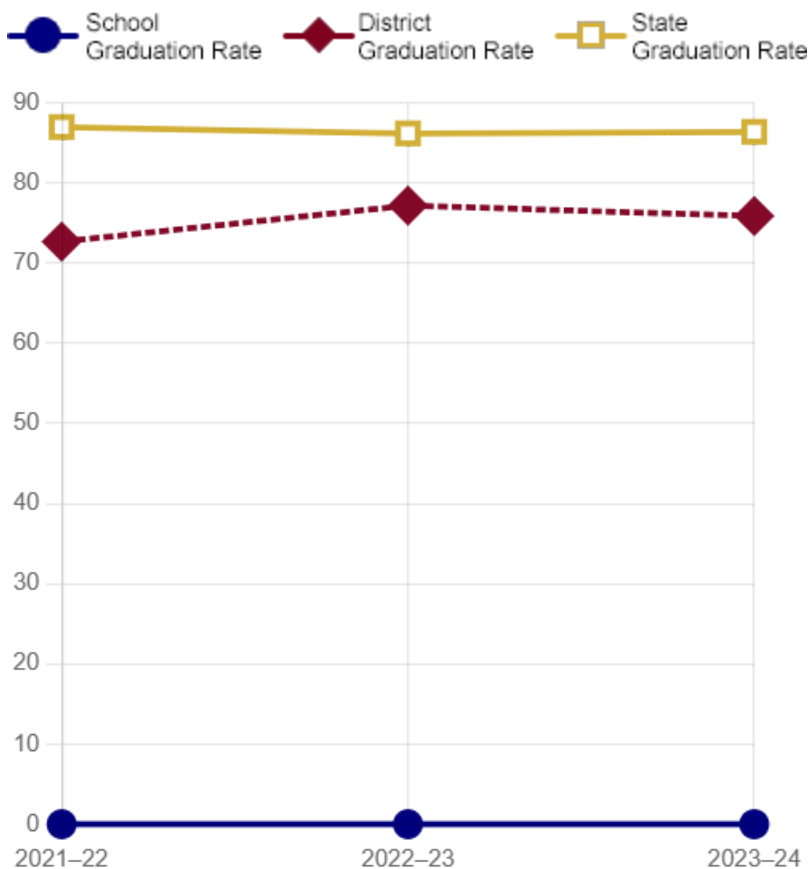

Graduation Rate and Dropout Rate (Four-Year Cohort Rate)

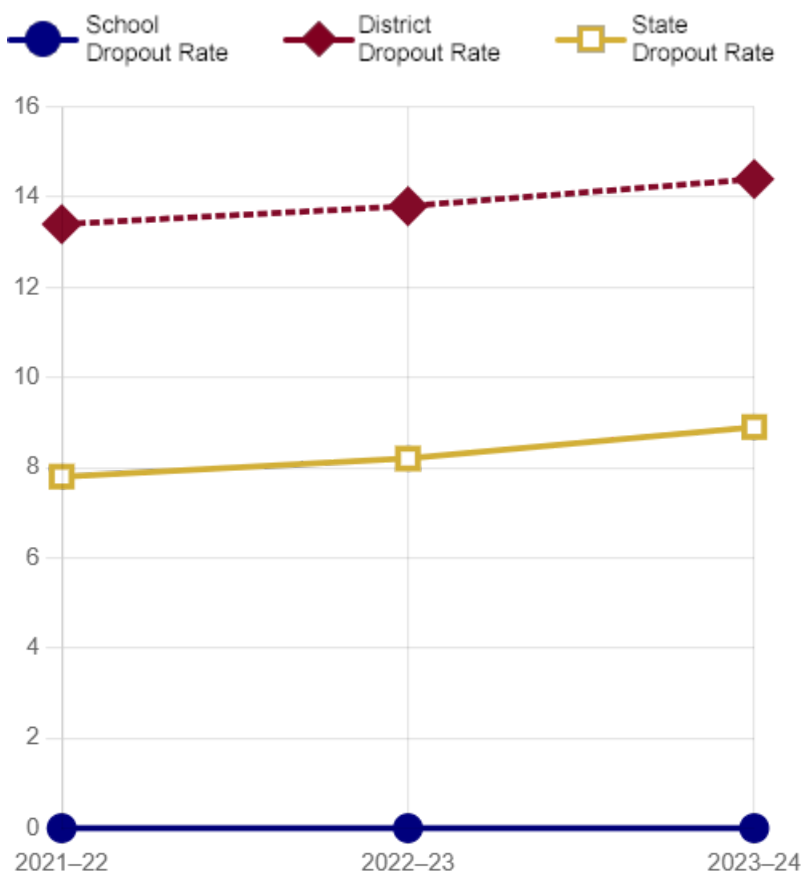

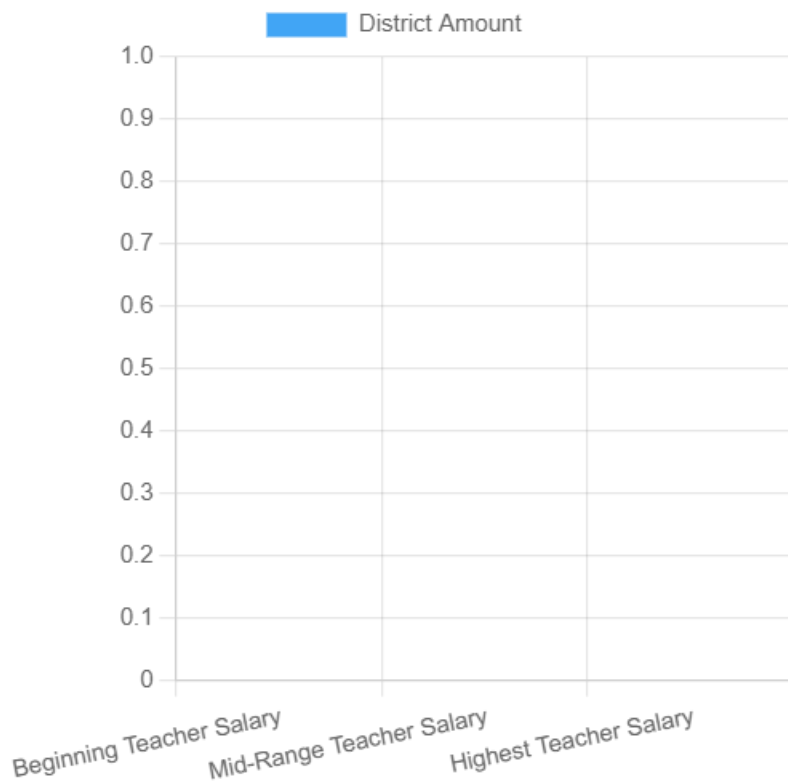

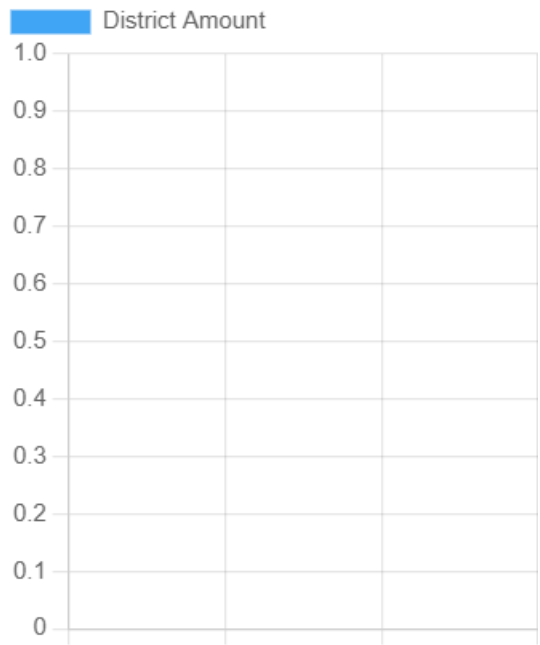
